## 2 Summary

4Memory is driving the **digital transformation of historical research** in Germany and beyond by building a **sustainable, FAIR-compliant** infrastructure connecting **archives, museums, libraries, researchers and data services** across the historically oriented humanities. With 11 applicant and co-applicant institutions and 74 participants, we are among the largest NFDI consortia, representing diverse institutional types to serve its entire community. Through constant exchange, we have tailored our work programme to our community's needs, developing a community-specific agenda that also contributes to the NFDI as a whole. Key objectives are **improving the handling of historical research data, deepening relationships between data providers and users** and **redefining research data management (RDM)** by providing services, resources for knowledge dissemination and professional consultations. Led by established institutional leaders and supported by the German Historical Association (VHD), our consortium has achieved a substantial degree of embeddedness in our community. Building upon our community's many contributions, we have achieved significant visibility in a field that is undergoing substantial digital transformation but still relies heavily upon analogue sources and methods. Through **active outreach** into the different sectors of our community, **support for researchers** at all stages of their careers and **a broad palette of services**, 4Memory is now a significant force shaping the future of historical studies. Our consortium has **remained very stable**, with only minor changes due to external factors, such as the DFG's eligibility criteria, as well as changes within the NFDI, such as an increasing focus on services, which led to the creation of a new post ("Services Manager") in our coordination office. We have grown through the **"Incubator Funds" process**, which integrated twelve new projects and four new participant institutions by the end of 2025.

4Memory engages in extensive collaboration within the NFDI. We are represented at **all levels of NFDI governance** and participate in four of the five NFDI sections. By contributing to these "cross-cutting topics" 4Memory helps to build "oneNFDI" while ensuring its community's specific perspectives are represented. We also collaborate on **Base4NFDI services**, contributing to substantive work on projects like DMP4NFDI, PID4NFDI, and TS4NFDI. We have taken a **lead role in initiating exchanges** with other consortia regarding effective coordination, in particular with the three other humanities consortia under the **Humanities@NFDI** framework. **Beyond the NFDI**, the consortium employs a **decentralised internationalisation strategy**. This includes heavy involvement from the **German Historical Institutes (GHIs)** abroad, participation in European research infrastructures like **DARIAH-EU** and **EOSC**, and collaborative projects with international institutions. We also utilize **FactGrid**, a Wikibase instance designed for global, multilingual research collaboration. 4Memory's vision centres on **enabling the digital transformation** of historical research by developing urgently needed digital methods and RDM tools. Key components of this vision are:

- **The 4Memory Data Space:** A core infrastructure intended to link over 224,000,000 datasets via a knowledge graph, enabling researchers to reuse data through both traditional and innovative methods.
- **Cultural Transformation:** Fostering a shift in the discipline through **data literacy training**, support for early-career researchers, and the promotion of **FAIR and CARE principles** specifically adapted for historical data.
- **Ethical and Multiperspectival Standards:** Developing data-ethics frameworks that account for **non-European perspectives**, colonial history, and the challenges of **multilingual data processing**.
- **AI Adaptation:** Empowering researchers to navigate the opportunities and challenges of **artificial intelligence** in handling historical data.

The intensive collaboration of those working in 4Memory in our first three years has enabled us to build up a highly motivated and active network. Among our **successes** have been:

- Despite expanding demands on our resources related to contributing to the NFDI and the changing needs of our community, our **key milestones and deliverables remain on-target** and we have made a substantial part of our **service portfolio** operational.
- We developed **new projects and services** through enabling new **contributions from our community** and our annual **Incubator Funds**.
- We established effective **collaborative relationships** with other consortia, particularly our fellow Humanities@NFDI colleagues, across various activities, whether in the context of constructively shaping the discussion about the development of the NFDI, joint presentations of our activities at conferences or in the provision of services.

There have been a few key **challenges**:

- To adapt to **the NFDI's evolving governance and reporting landscape**, we restructured our coordination office, enhancing efficiency and responsiveness to community needs.
- To deal with the **financial challenges** of rising wage costs and the uncertainties related to the future of the NFDI, we have had to find new efficiencies and shift resources.
- To proactively address **the rise of AI**, we have, among other things, increased training on the use of AI in historical data analysis in our workshop series and are currently developing guidelines for the responsible use of AI in humanities research.
