

About the DFG



The Deutsche Forschungsgemeinschaft (DFG, German Research Foundation) is the central, independent research funding organisation in Germany. It serves all branches of science and the humanities by funding research projects at universities and other research institutions.

The DFG promotes excellence by selecting the best research projects on a competitive basis and facilitating national and international collaboration among researchers. Its mandate also includes encouraging the advancement and training of early career researchers, promoting gender equality in the German scientific and academic communities, providing scientific policy advice, and fostering relations between the research community and society and the private sector.

The DFG is an association under private law. Its member organisations include research universities, non-university research institutions, such as the Max Planck Society, Fraunhofer, the Helmholtz Association and the Leibniz Association, the academies of sciences and humanities, and a number of scientific associations. The DFG has a current annual budget of €3.3 billion, provided primarily by the German federal government (69 percent) and the states (29 percent), but also including EU funds and private donations.


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Programmes

In 2019, the DFG funded 31,150 new and ongoing projects with a funding volume of €3.3 billion. The scientific review of proposals is an integral part of the DFG's funding process. Assessments by peer reviewers form the basis for subsequent funding decisions. In the reporting year, approximately 22,100 written reviews were received from round 15,200 reviewers, 22 percent of whom were women. Just over a third of all reviewers were based at research institutions outside Germany. In total, about 21,200 funding proposals were decided on in 2019.

More than a third of funding (37 percent) was allocated to the individual grants programmes, which include traditional research grants and early career grant programmes. In its coordinated programmes – Research Centres, Research Units, Priority Programmes, Collaborative Research Centres and Research Training Groups – the DFG funded a total of 850 research collaborations with a sum of €1.4 billion. This equates to a share of 44 percent.


Research funding by programme for 2019 (in €m and %)



Funding Rates in the Individual Grants Programmes

The number of proposals to individual grant programmes has been consistently high over recent years. In the 2019 reporting year, decisions were made on approximately 13,800 proposals in individual grants programmes, and a total of 17,100 projects with a funding volume of over €1.2 billion were funded during that time period. The funding rate for new proposals in individual grants programmes was 33.3 percent. Approximately every third proposal was successful.

Funding rates in the individual grants programmes by scientific discipline 2017 to 2019 (in %)





Research Areas

The DFG is open to all branches of science and the humanities. The distribution of DFG funding among the scientific disciplines has been stable over the years. In 2019, the greatest share of funding was allocated to the life sciences, at approximately 36 percent. Among the 14 research areas, almost a quarter of the funding, totalling €725.4 million in 2019, was awarded in the field of medicine.
